The Stone Age monuments that had already been discovered on Orkney, form the rest of the UNESCO World Heritage site, The Heart of Neolithic Orkney. Dramatic and atmospheric in Orkney's bleak northern landscape, they continue to hang on to their mystery. The Standing Stones of Stenness may be the oldest stone circle and henge in the British Isles. Carbon dating puts its origin to about 5,400 years ago.

A scheduled monument in Scotland is a nationally important archaeological site or monument which is given legal protection by being placed on a list (or "schedule") maintained by Historic Environment Scotland. The aim of scheduling is to preserve the country's most significant sites and monuments as far as possible in the form in which they have been inherited.
